



The Nicene Creed

Please stand

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,



Summer Series on Women in the Bible

Today we are celebrating the feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary, (transferred from August 15), sometimes referred to as the Dormition, or the Assumption of Mary. There are several feasts of the Virgin Mary which are celebrated throughout the year, but this is her principal feast, and commemorates her death and entrance into heaven- a foretaste of the blessed hope for which we all await. On August 28, we will honor "The Forgotten Women."

Our hymns during this series also highlight the gifts of women.

The Opening Hymn, *Ye who claim the faith of Jesus*, written by an Anglican priest in the 19th century, praises God for the Mother of God's place in salvation history. The text raises Mary up as a model of discipleship for all Christians- and although not present in the Hymnal 1982, the original hymn (7 verses long) implores Mary's intercessions for the sick, the poor, and the Church.

The hymn of praise, Rejoice in the Lord always, was written by Evelyn Fern Tarner.

The Gospel Alleluia was composed by our very own Kathy Shanklin.

The *Sanctus* was composed by Betty Carr Pulkingham, who was a member of Holy Comforter Episcopal Church in Burlington, NC before founding *The Community of Celebration*, an Episcopal intentional religious community, with her husband. She served on the Episcopal Church's Standing Committee on Church Music until 1984. She died in 2019.

The first Communion hymn, an African hymn to Mary, is an interpretation of the Hail Mary prayer. The Hail Mary prayer is composed from two passages from the Gospels: the annunciation of the Angel Gabriel to Mary, where she is acclaimed as full of grace, and the prophetic words of Saint Elizabeth, who upon learning that Mary was pregnant with Jesus proclaimed that she was most blessed among women.

The second Communion hymn praises God for the life, humility and obedience of Mary. It extols the patience of Mary who suffered at the cross, and rejoices with Mary in her elevation to those heavenly places with her Son.

The text of the Closing hymn, *Jerusalem, my happy home*, is based on the writings of St. Augustine. The text is reminiscent of the psalms, wherein the psalmist laments being absent from the city of God, and prays to be in God's presence. The hymn reminds us of the saints who await us in Glory, principally the Mother of God. The hymn tune was composed by Annabel Morris Buchanan, a folklorist who promoted the music of the Appalachian Mountains. The tune, *Land of rest*, is an adaptation of a traditional Appalachian folk melody.
