


Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

By faith Abraham and Sarah obeyed when they were called to set out for a place that they were to receive as an inheritance; and they set out, not knowing where they were going. By faith they stayed for a time in the land they had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Rebeccah, and Jacob, Rachel and Leah, who were heirs with them of the same promise. For they looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith Abraham and Sarah received power of procreation, even though they were too old-- and Sarah herself was barren-- because they considered God faithful who had promised. Therefore from one couple, and they as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore."

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, God has prepared a city for them.



Summer Series on Women in the Bible

The focus of today's homily was on the holy matriarch Sarah. Next week it will be on the Woman who lost and found a coin. We will celebrate the feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary on Sunday August 21, and on August 28, we will honor "The Forgotten Women."

Our hymns during this series also highlight the gifts of women.

The Opening Hymn, *Rejoice, rejoice believer,* is a German hymn often sung during the season of Advent. Originally written in 1700 by Laurentius Laurenti, who served at Bremen Cathedral, it was later translated into English in 1859 by Sarah Laurie Findlater, a Scottish author and wife of a Presbyterian pastor.

The hymn of praise, Rejoice in the Lord always, was written by Evelyn Fern Tarner.

The Gospel Alleluia was composed by our very own Kathy Shanklin.

The *Sanctus* was composed by Betty Carr Pulkingham, who was a member of Holy Comforter Episcopal Church in Burlington, NC before founding *The Community of Celebration*, an Episcopal intentional religious community, with her husband. She served on the Episcopal Church's Standing Committee on Church Music until 1984. She died in 2019.

The Communion hymn was written by the Rev. Sylvia Dunstan, who served as a minister in the United Church of Canada until she died from cancer at the age of 38 in 1993. The tune was composed by Ana Hernandez, a latina Episcopalian, composer and member of the Episcopal Church's Standing Committee on Liturgy and Worship.

The Closing hymn was written and composed by Natalie Sleeth, a Methodist organist, hymn writer and composer of many choral anthems. She died in 1992.
