

# A Reading from Deuteronomy (Please be seated)

Moses said: The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; you shall heed such a prophet. This is what you requested of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: "If I hear the voice of the Lord my God any more, or ever again see this great fire, I will die." Then the Lord replied to me: "They are right in what they have said. I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command. Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable. But any prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, or who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak—that prophet shall die. # Psalm 111 Antiphon: The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom.

## A Reading from Paul's First Epistle to the Corinthians

Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; but anyone who loves God is known by him. Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one." Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth—as in fact there are many gods and many lords yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist. It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. "Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed. But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.








Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. Happy are they who are called to the Supper of the Lamb.

# Today is Septuagesima Sunday. What Does That Mean?

Septuagesima is the name of the Third Sunday before Lent, and the beginning of Shrovetide- the short period of preparation for Lent that concludes on Shrove Tuesday. Septuagesima means 70 (as in the 70th day before Easter); but this is a symbolic name. There are in fact less than 70 days from this Sunday until Easter.

Originally this Sunday provided a gradual shift to a more penitential tone at worship. The Gloria and Alleluia were removed on this Sunday, and people began making a pre-Ash Wednesday Confession, with many confessions being made on Shrove Tuesday.

Vatican II suppressed this Pre-Lenten season, and the Anglican Churches soon followed. Today it is more of a sign that Lent is near. It is a reminder that we should begin a more intentional examination of our conscience as we discern how to benefit from the Lenten Fast. This is a good time to think about what you will fast for Lent, how you will use the Lenten disciplines to grow in love, and to determine whether or not you would like to make an appointment with the priest to make a sacramental confession in order to receive the grace of absolution.

If you need spiritual direction in your discernment and preparation, Father Rob is always available to make an appointment with you.
